Albany, NY – [The Arc Lexington](#) and [Warren-Washington-Albany ARC](#) (WWAARC) have created a partnership to expand the Transitions program into the Capital Region. WWAARC offers employment supports to Transitions students who attend the Transitions program in Albany. These supports include internships, career counseling, on-the-job coaching services, job training and more.

Based in Mayfield, NY, the [Transitions](#) program focuses on building academic skills, life skills and general independence for teens and young adults with autism and other learning differences. Through partnership with local colleges, internships in community businesses and supported living opportunities, Transitions helps young people on the autism spectrum or with learning differences make successful transitions from adolescence to young adulthood.
